About the Declaration

- **Adopted by the UN 13 September 2007**
- **Minimum international standards to protect & promote human rights**
- **Important international milestone; recognition of indigenous rights**
- **Indigenous peoples as distinct peoples**
- **Agreement between States**
- **Support of many leaders representing the 370 million indigenous peoples**



Everyone has human rights

Indigenous peoples are equal to all other peoples and have all the human rights that everyone has, including:

the right to self-determination;

the right to be free from discrimination

the right to be respected as distinct peoples

Collective, as well as individual rights

Indigenous Peoples and human rights



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Historical injustices, including through colonisation & the loss of their lands & resources, have prevented indigenous peoples from fully exercising all of their rights. Therefore there is an urgent need to respect & promote the rights of indigenous peoples



Declaration: Full realisation of human rights



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- **Offers assistance to ensure indigenous peoples fully enjoy their rights, & to strengthen the relationship between States & indigenous peoples.**
- **A minimum standard of achievement to be pursued in a spirit of partnership & mutual respect**

Universal Human Rights



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- **Entitled to all human rights**
- **Individual & collective rights**
- **Culture, identity & language**
- **Development**





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Indigenous Rights

- **Self determination, institutions**
- **Culture & traditions**
- **Vision & aspirations**
- **Protection of resources**



Participation & Non-discrimination



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- **Full participation**
- **Recognition as distinct peoples**
- **Freedom from discrimination**
- **Pursue own economic & social development**





Political Support

- **Maori & Green Parties Support**
- **Government (Labour, NZ First, Progressive) does not**
- **National, Act & United Future positions are uncertain**

- **ULIN Treaty**



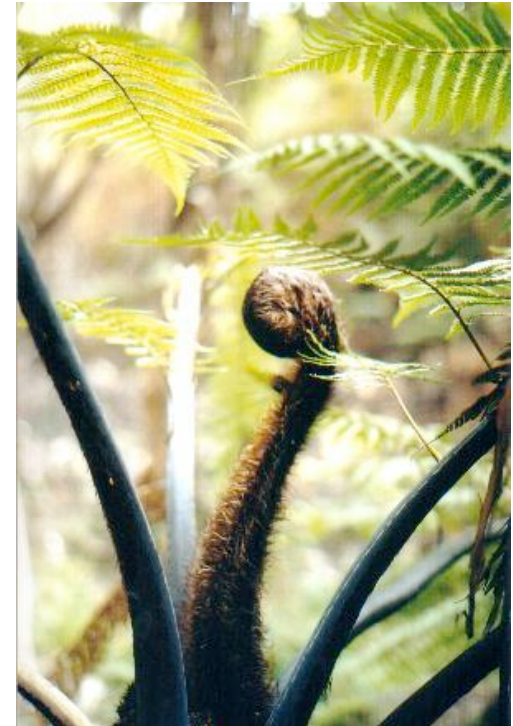
