

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The National Iwi Chairs Forum, supported by a coalition of national education organisations, including PPTA Te Wehengarua, has launched a petition against the Government's removal of the requirement for school boards to give effect to Te Tiriti o Waitangi by repealing section 127(2)(e) of the Education and Training Act 2020.

The petition aims to send a clear message to the Government: Removing Te Tiriti from education law undermines the Government's responsibility to ensure every learner, Māori and non-Māori, thrives in an education system that honours the Māori-Crown relationship.


